

The Future of E-Commerce: Is it on a Blockchain?

Washington and Lee Law Review's 2022–2023 Lara D. Gass Symposium The Future of E-Commerce: Is it on a Blockchain?. This year's Symposium is a collaborative effort with Professors Joshua Fairfield and Michael Bombace.

Digital ownership, cryptocurrencies, and new uses for blockchain technology have surged in popularity in the last several years. The aim of the Symposium is to offer a critical vehicle for discussing why blockchain technology is relevant to the legal community and how the law should prepare for the impact of these new technologies.

The keynote speaker for the event is Sultan Meghji, Senior Advisor at Reciprocal Ventures and Professor at Duke University. Meghji most recently served as the inaugural Chief Innovation Officer at the FDIC.

Panel discussions during the event will include analyzing Decentralized Autonomous Organizations (DAOs), examining regulatory developments on cryptocurrencies and blockchains, and debating how to ensure the legal regime can effectively handle digital ownership. The DAO Panel will feature Brian Avello, Chris Cameron, Michael Fluhr, and Matthew McGuire; the Regulation Panel will feature Carole House, Vy Le, Michael Mosier, and Dina Rochkind; and the Digital Ownership Panel will feature Jared Greenfield, Christine Kim, Aaron Perzanowski, and Niloufer Selvadurai.

Sultan Meghji Senior Advisor at Reciprocal Ventures and Professor at Duke University



Sultan Meghji most recently served as the inaugural Chief Innovation Officer at the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation of the

United States Government. A noted expert in AI, Biotech, Cybersecurity, Quantum Computing & Web3, he also serves as a scholar at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, a fellow at the George Mason National Security Institute and is a distinguished member of the Bretton Woods Committee. Mr. Meghji also serves as a professor in the graduate programs at Duke University's Pratt Engineering School with a focus on AI, Web3 & Cybersecurity. Mr. Meghji has a 30 year career in technology, including launching, scaling and selling a number of startups in frontier technologies, biotech and fintech. He currently advises both America's Frontier Fund and Reciprocal Ventures.

He has served in an advisory capacity to the US government: Central Intelligence Agency, Department of Homeland Security, Federal Bureau of Investigations, Federal Reserve, Office of the Comptroller of the Currency and Department of the Treasury. Internationally he has served as an advisor to the German Bundesbank, European Central Bank, G7, G20, International Monetary Fund, United Nations and the governments of Singapore and the United Kingdom.


Niloufer Selvadurai Professor at Macquarie University Law

Niloufer Selvadurai is a Professor and Director of Research and Innovation at Macquarie Law School, Macquarie University, Sydney,

Australia. Niloufer is a technology law scholar who researches and teaches on the effective governance of emerging and evolving technologies. She explores how technological change undermines the efficacy of laws, especially in the fields of digital finance, smart contracts, cyber security, data privacy and IP, and how legal frameworks can be reimagined to strengthen explainability and trust. A feature of her work is interdisciplinary collaborations with computing, engineering and finance. Niloufer is an academic partner of the Digital Finance CRC that has been awarded Australian government and industry funding over a 10-year period to develop a commercial, technological and regulatory framework for the digitisation of real-world assets, and a chief investigator on an Australian Research Council NIS Discovery Research Grant on 'Fighting Global Phone Scams with Conversational AI' and a CSIRO Emerging Technologies Program funded project on 'Central Bank Digital Currency - Infrastructure & Applications'.

Aaron Perzanowski Professor at University Michigan Law

Aaron Perzanowski is the inaugural Thomas W. Lacchia Professor of Law at the University of Michigan Law School. He teaches and writes



... His books include The End of Ownership, co-authored with Jason Schultz (MIT Press, 2016), and The Right to Repair (Cambridge University Press, 2022). His current book project addresses how shifting conceptions of ownership threaten to undermine the core functions of libraries. Professor Perzanowski also has written about the ways in which informal governance and social norms influence creative production in contexts ranging from the tattoo industry to the clowning community. Creativity Without Law, his 2017 book with Kate Darling (NYU Press), collected much of the growing body of scholarship exploring the interplay between IP and social norms.

Christine Kim Professor at Cardozo Law

Young Ran (Christine) Kim is a Professor of Law at Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law.

Her research centers on international tax, business tax, and taxation in the digital economy. Her work has been published in the UCLA Law Review, Notre Dame Law Review, UC Irvine Law Review, Alabama Law Review, UC Davis Law Review, Harvard International Law Journal, and Virginia Tax Review, among others. Until 2022, Kim was an associate professor of law at the University of Utah. Kim received her J.S.D. from NYU School of Law, LL.M. from Harvard Law School, where she was awarded the Landon H. Gammon Fellowship for academic excellence, and Bachelor of Law summa cum laude from Seoul National University. Kim is admitted to the bars of New York and South Korea and has worked at Yulchon, Caplin & Drysdale, and Sullivan & Cromwell.

More recently, Vy oversaw financial regulatory strategy as Deputy General Counsel and Compliance Officer at a crypto startup, where she advised on the design of the project's token, wallet, and Web3 identity protocol.

Vy received her B.A. in Economics and Political Science from U.C. San Diego and her J.D. from Yale Law School. She began her legal career at the law firm WilmerHale, where she advised traditional financial institutions and public companies, their boards, and executives on everything from the securities laws to AML compliance, served as an Assistant General Counsel at JPMorgan's Government Investigations & Regulatory Enforcement group, and was a federal district court clerk in the Southern District of New York.

Dina Ellis Rochkind is Counsel, Government Affairs and Strategy in the Paul Hastings Fintech practice and is based in the firm's



He has been an adjunct professor (Advanced Evidence for Trial) at Georgetown University Law Center and began his public service as a prosecutor with the Manhattan District Attorney's Office.

Before joining DeFi Labs and Mauve, Matt had wide-ranging experiences that made crypto/web3 a natural fit. He worked in private practice in Richmond, Virginia and Washington, DC at multiple international law firms helping clients navigate complex regulatory and litigation issues. He also served in government with the Virginia Attorney General's Office as the Principal Deputy Solicitor General & Executive Division Counsel, arguing more than 20 appeals including one in the US Supreme Court when he was 31. Matt also worked in-house, building Shopify's global regulatory legal function from scratch, leading Shopify's global privacy team, and guiding the company in overhauling its corporate governance structure under Canadian and US law as the chief of staff to Shopify's General Counsel.

Lara served as Symposium Editor for the Washington and Lee Review, organizing the Law Review's 2014 symposium focused on the 40th anniversary of Roe v. Wade. Lara was active within the Women Law Students Organization and also served as a Kirgis Fellow, the law school's peer mentoring group, during the 2012-13 academic year. In January 2014, Lara received recognition for her academic achievements, her leadership abilities, her service to the law school and university community, and her character when she was inducted into Omicron Delta Kappa, the National Leadership Honor Society.
